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Monterey Bay Sanctuary Continues Review of Rules

The basic rules and plan that govern activities in Monterey Bay such as fishing, boating and harvesting are still under public review. Community members have the opportunity to provide comments and suggestions as the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary revises its management plan and proposes new regulations for the Sanctuary. The City has provided comments to Sanctuary staff during the review process and supports the conservation, education, research and water quality protection efforts proposed in the program. "How the Sanctuary program balances use with conservation is very important to our residents and businesses," said Monterey Harbormaster Steve Scheiblauer. "The community needs to be informed about the process and stay involved." The City is also encouraging the Sanctuary to work cooperatively with neighboring communities and interested industries to find compromises, as opposed to establishing additional regulations.

Some of the items currently under consideration include:

- Focus on resource protection.
- Protect biodiversity by adopting more fully-protected areas, marine reserves, throughout Sanctuary.
- Place more education articles in media.
- Pursue fishing regulations only in Federal waters.
- Develop a plan to address the potential for additional invasive, exotic species.

Focus on Trees - Deciding Where to Plant

Planting trees throughout the local community continues to be a goal for both the City and residents. However, community members should find out where their property line is before planting because individuals are required to secure a permit before planting trees on City property or public rights of way. A right of way is land designated for underground and overhead utilities such as sewer mains, water and power lines; or for streets, curbs and sidewalks. Trees in these areas can damage pipes and property and cause power outages. Planting trees on

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private property is not regulated. Residents are encouraged to plant and maintain their own trees for the benefit of the community's urban forest.

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Community Upgrades Made Possible by Tourist Dollars

More than \$2 million is being spent on neighborhood projects. Street and safety upgrades, sidewalk, curb and gutter improvements and neighborhood traffic studies — all this and more are being funded this year through NIP monies. Established in 1985, the Neighborhood Improvement Program (NIP) sends tourist-generated dollars directly into the City's residential neighborhoods. Under a Charter Amendment, at least 16% of the money collected through hotel taxes (Transient Occupancy Tax) must be spent on neighborhood and community improvements.

What is a project?

A Neighborhood Improvement Project is any upgrade (not on private property) to public streets, storm drains, sewers, sidewalks, walkways, lighting, traffic control devices, landscaping and beautification, parks, recreational facilities or other public buildings.

You can nominate a project by sending in the following info: *name, address, telephone, project location, description of improvement and description of need/expected benefits.* The deadline to submit projects is the second Friday each February. However, you can send in your ideas anytime.

Grab your gear, head to skate park

Skateboarders and in-line skaters should try the

Monterey Skate Park located in the El Estero Park Complex behind Sollecito Park. The park is open daily 9 a.m. until dusk and is designed for skaters of all ages; however, skaters under eight years old must be supervised by an adult. All skaters must wear safety gear, including a helmet, knee and elbow pads and wrist/hand guards (City Ordinance No. 3268).

Rules of the skateboard road

Legally, skateboarders are "pedestrians" and must follow the same rules as those who walk. Skateboarders must stay on the sidewalk, cross the road at crosswalks or intersections and yield to cars. As of Jan. 1, 2003, skateborders also must wear helmets when riding on public property, per State law. Skateboarding is permitted on the Monterey Coastal/Recreation Trail from the back side of the Maritime Museum (near the tunnel entrance) to the city of Seaside.

Know where not to skateboard

Skateboarding is restricted in certain areas of the City including the Coastal/Recreation Trail from Pacific Grove to the Custom House Plaza; the surrounding State Parks property and downtown Monterey. Signs are posted in these areas. Skateboarding or trespassing on private property or in public or private parking lots is also illegal. Many property owners have authorized the police to take action if a violation is discovered. Fines for violations range from \$50 to \$100 and can be increased for repeat offenders. Reckless operation of skateboards, or any wheeled vehicle, is not permitted.

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Help Keep Storm Drains Clear



Creeks, catch basins, gutters, roads and even driveways make up Monterey's storm drain

rainwater collection system. The storm drain system is not connected to sewer lines, and water and pollutants collected there run into Monterey Bay untreated.

On an average day these pollutants flow into the storm drain system, and ultimately into the Bay:

Motor oil from roads, driveways, parking lots and catch basins

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- Heavy metals such as copper and lead from roofs, rain gutters and brake dust
- Detergents from washing cars or anything washed outside
- Fertilizers and pesticides from lawns and gardens
- Bare soil from hillsides
- Leaves and other yard waste
- Trash and cigarette butts
- Pet waste from lawns, streets and sidewalk

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How can you help?

- Maintain vehicles regularly. Use a drip tray to catch fluids until leaks are fixed. Recycle
 used motor oil for free at Jiffy Lube. Prevent spills by using a drip pan. Clean up spills
 with an absorbent material such as cat litter.
- Wash cars on unpaved surfaces or take them to a commercial car wash. Pour soapy water down an indoor sink or toilet
- Use non-toxic alternatives to pesticides. Never apply pesticides or fertilizers when rain is forecast.
- Landscape yards so that rainwater gets absorbed. Grow native plants that need less water.
- Put yard waste in a disposal can, not in the gutter or storm drain.
- Do not place wood, logs or plants where they can wash into the storm drain.
- Place trash in proper containers and secure the lid.
- Pick up animal waste regularly. Put it in the toilet or wrap it in a bag and place in trash.

Food Scraps: Trash or Treasure?

Banana peels, coffee grounds and filters; potato skins, plant clippings and leaves: trash or treasure? By composting, individuals can turn these and other scraps into enriched topsoil. Composting is a fun and easy way to reduce the amount of waste going to the landfill or to the sewage treatment plant. It takes very little work, just collect food scraps and layer them in a container. Time and heat do the rest.

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Seniors, Special Groups Save on Sewer Fees

Some community members may be exempt from paying the 28.1% sewer service fee to the Monterey Regional Water Pollution Control Agency (MRWPCA). Community members who meet the following criteria as defined in Ordinance No. 2730 could be eligible for a fee exemption.

- 65 years of age or older or disabled; and
- jointly or severally liable for the payment of the sewer service fee; and
- the sewer services are used only at your principal place of residence.

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For History Buffs Only...

Discover How Monterey Got its Name, Celebrate the Quadricentennial

Sebastian Vizcaíno left what is now Acapulco, Mexico, in May 1602 – 400 years ago – to map out Alta California and find places where Manila Galleons from the east could stop and rest.

On Dec. 16, 1602, the ships San Diego and Santo Tamás and the frigate Tres Reyes sailed past Carmel Bay, around Point Pinos and entered the harbor. Vizcaíno named the bay "Monterey" after the viceroy of Mexico, Don Gaspar de Zuñiga y Acevedo, Count of Monte Rey. His crew went ashore the next day and pitched a church tent under the shade of an oak with branches that touched



the tidewater (located near where the north entrance to the Lighthouse Avenue tunnel is today).

In the shadow of this historic tree, Father Andrés de la Asunción celebrated the first recorded mass north of San Diego. Remnants of the oak tree are on display at San Carlos Church.

Parking Deal Targets Sports Center Users

Pay just \$1 for parking next time you visit the Monterey Sports Center. Parking cards are now available for the adjacent East Custom House Garage. The fee is \$1 per entrance, with no time limit. Because parking at the Sports Center was reduced to make way for the expansion, the City developed a special parking program. Previously, users who parked in the Sports Center lot paid 50 cents an hour for the two-hour meters. The new cards are pre-programmed for one, five or ten uses and are on sale at the Sports Center. 

Safety Tips:

Get an Emergency Safety Plan

Do you have a plan if disaster strikes? Do you know what to do before, during and after emergencies? Find out today. The City can help you make a plan for you and your family. Get the Home Safety Emergency Plan by calling or emailing the <u>Fire Department</u> at 831.646.3900.

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Keep Homes Safer, More Secure

Potential burglars look for an easy mark or "target." Surveys show that a thief will look for a house where they can enter quickly, quietly and undetected.

You and your family can practice some simple safety tips that can help keep your home more secure.

- Around windows and doors, trim trees and shrubs that might help conceal a burglar.
- Trim trees and shrubs so your home can be seen from the street and neighboring residences.
- Use open metal fencing and gates to prevent access from the street to the side and back of your home. This "see through" fencing will provide a physical barrier, while allowing for natural surveillance.
- Plant roses, cactus or other thorny plants below windows.
- Use landscaping material which clearly defines your private property from the public sidewalk or street.
- Make your address clearly visible from the street.
- Install security lighting, activated by motion sensors, on the sides and back of your home.
- Report all suspicious persons and activities immediately to the police by calling 831.646.3914.
 - If you see someone breaking into a home, call 911. Stay on the phone and be prepared to provide additional information.
- Stop deliveries and have a trusted friend or neighbor watch your home when you're out of town. Notify the police department and provide the name and phone number of an emergency contact. Police volunteers can make periodic exterior safety checks while

you are away.

The Monterey Police Department also provides free security surveys for homes and businesses. To schedule an appointment, call Public Education Officer Adam Costa at 831.646.3819 (costa@ci.monterey.ca.us).

Move Right for Sirens and Lights

Cooperation is the key to making sure emergency public safety vehicles arrive at their destination quickly and safely. *Follow these simple rules to help*.

When drivers hear or see an emergency vehicle, pull over as close to the right edge of the road as possible and stop. Remain stopped until all emergency vehicles have passed. However, don't stop in an intersection. If you are in an intersection when you see an emergency vehicle, continue slowly through the intersection and then pull to the right as soon as possible and stop. Per the California Driver Handbook, "yield the right-of-way to emergency vehicles using a siren and red light." *Remember, in an emergency seconds count.*

Keep Your Sidewalks Safe, Slip Free

Property owners are responsible for maintaining the area in front of their property and keeping it free of safety hazards. When it rains, or during irrigation, water seeps over sidewalks and forms mossy areas where pedestrians can slip and fall. How to clean your sidewalk: Use a stiff bristle broom to whisk moss and foreign material away. Use biodegradable soap, if needed. Do not use bleach or other cleaners since runoff ends up in the Monterey Bay Sanctuary. For more info, call the City's Construction Management Division at 646.3997 (clement@ci.monterey.ca.us).
