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Fred Meurer retired as Monterey City Manager on December 30, 2013.

Meurer worked for the City of Monterey for 27 years, including 22 years as City Manager.

Fred Meurer joined the City in 1986 as Special Projects Manager in the City Manager's Office. His first project was the construction of a "swim gym" which is today known as the Monterey Sports Center.

Meurer oversaw construction of the Recreation Trail and expansion of Window on the Bay. He created innovative partnerships with the military and neighboring communities to deliver cost-effective municipal services.

Meurer developed a municipal-military partnership, in which the City of Monterey provides fire protection and other municipal services to Department of Defense installations, including the Defense Language Institute, the Naval Postgraduate School and Camp Roberts. Known as "The Monterey Model", the partnership has been so successful that federal legislation was enacted allowing other communities nationwide to follow suit. "The Monterey Model" was a solution to Base Realignment and Closure Commission (BRAC) rounds, which threatened the military presence in Monterey.

Under Meurer's leader-

ship, the City initiated partnerships for fire protection with the neighboring communities of Pacific Grove, Carmel-by-the-Sea, Sand City and the Monterey Airport.

Meurer was appointed City Manager in 1991 and has served three Mayors: Clyde Roberson, Dan Albert and Chuck Della Sala, and 12 City Councils.

In response to questions about his retirement,
Meurer said, "To say that I will miss this City doesn't begin to touch the depth of the emotions that I feel. It has been an honor to serve the citizens of Monterey. It has been an honor to serve our Mayors and Councils as City Manager these past 22 years."

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INTERIM CITY MANAGER NAMED

The Monterey City Council named Assistant City Manager Mike McCarthy to the position of Interim City Manager effective January 1, 2014. McCarthy stepped in to lead the 400-person City organization following Fred Meurer's retirement.

"The City Council has full confidence in Mike's ability to lead Monterey through the transition to a new City Manager and to keep key projects moving forward," said Mayor Chuck Della Sala. Recruitment for a permanent City Manager is underway, but is not expected to be finalized until spring.

"It is an honor to be entrusted with the responsibility of leading the City of Monterey as Interim City Manager," said McCarthy. "My task in the months ahead will be to continue on the path set by our Council and to keep the organization running smoothly."

McCarthy's key areas of focus include preparation of the 2014-15 City budget, in light of state takeaways of millions of dollars in redevelopment funds; renovation of the Monterey Conference Center funded by the hotels through creation of a Conference Center Facilities District; and hiring executives for several open positions, including Finance Director.

Other areas requiring McCarthy's attention are the future of the Golden State Theatre and the Cooper-Molera adobe; revitalization of the North Fremont and

downtown commercial districts; and homelessness.

McCarthy has been with the City for more than 10 years. He was promoted to Assistant City Manager in 2012 and stayed in his position as Human Resources Director. McCarthy was named Human Resources Director in 2009.

Prior to coming to Monterey, McCarthy worked for

the City of San Jose and NASA's Office of the Inspector General. He was a police officer for the City of Lake Forest Park, Washington. McCarthy has a Bachelor of Arts degree from San Jose State University and a Master of Public Administration degree from the University of Washington.

McCarthy lives in Monterey with his wife and three children. He is actively involved in community activities in which his children participate, including baseball, basketball, dance and gymnastics.

The City Council is in the process of hiring a permanent City Manager. The Council has narrowed the field of candidates and conducted a final round of interviews in early January. A new City Manager could be hired by this spring.

FIRE PARTNERSHIP WITH AIRPORT

The City of Monterey and the Monterey Peninsula Airport District have entered into a partnership for fire services between the Monterey Fire Department and the Airport Fire Department, effective January 1, 2014. Under terms of the agreement, the Monterey Fire Department will provide fire protection and emergency services to the Airport for \$1.65 million dollars a vear.

The partnership will provide faster response times for fire and emergency medical calls to residences and businesses in Monterey along the Highway 68 corridor, Fisherman's Flats, Deer Flats and Ryan Ranch, and will improve fire protection coverage at the Monterey Peninsula Airport.

"This is a win for the City and the airport," said Monterey Fire Chief Gaudenz Panholzer.
"Monterey Fire will cut response time in half to most residences and businesses in an underserved section of the City and we will get a fully staffed and well-equipped fire station for a fraction of the cost

of constructing a new station."

"By integrating fire services, the Airport benefits

from access to a greater depth of resources and quicker response time in an emergency," said Airport General Manager Tom Greer. "This partnership allows the airport to focus on what it does best -- airport operations and moving thousands of

airline passengers safely in and out of Monterey every day."

The existing Airport Fire Station will become Station #6 in the Monterey Fire Department. The firefighters previously employed by the Airport have been offered employment with the Monterey Fire Department.

"The community will benefit from the integration of these highly trained Aircraft Rescue and Fire Fighting (ARFF) personnel into the Monterey force," said Greer.

Previously, Monterey Fire Station #3 (on Dela Vina Avenue at Montecito Avenue) was closest to the Highway 68 corridor, Ryan Ranch, Deer Flats, and Fisherman's Flats. Average response time from Station #3 to Deer Forest



Drive is 8 minutes. Average response time from Station #6 is expected to be 4 minutes. Commercial properties at the airport also will benefit from faster response times.

Station #6 is equipped with a structural fire-fighting engine, an ARFF engine and a mobile command vehicle. The mobile command vehicle allows incident command operations to be run at the scene of an incident and it will be available for use in all of the areas served by the Monterey Fire Department.

LOCALS PARKING

The City Council recently extended the locals parking program in the Waterfront and Cannery Row area through December 31, 2015. These parking programs are intended to encourage local residents to patronize the businesses and attractions in the Waterfront and Cannery Row areas.

Waterfront Parking Lot

This program offers 2-hours of free parking Monday through Thursday in the Waterfront Attendant Parking lot to all Monterey County residents (any person residing in the 939 zip code area), when an hourly rate is charged. Monterey

County residents must present their ticket and a driver's license with a local zip code at exit to the Parking Attendant to receive the first 2-hours of parking free.

Cannery Row Garage

This program offers free parking to all Monterey County residents (any person residing in the 939 zip code area) who enter the Cannery Row Garage after 4:00 p.m. The resident must present their ticket and a driver's license with a local zip code at exit to receive free parking. If a flat entry rate is being charged at the garage, the resident must present their

local driver's license at the entrance.

These local parking programs cannot be combined with any other discounted or first hour free parking programs.

In addition to these local parking programs, the Downtown West Garage at 340 Tyler Street, offers the first hour of parking free year round when an hourly rate is charged.

NEW POLICE VEHICLES

The Monterey Police Department has recently purchased more fuel efficient, faster, smarter and safer Police Interceptor sports utility vehicles.

Over two years ago, the Ford Motor Company stopped producing the traditional Ford Crown Victoria sedans. MPD began its search for a replacement patrol vehicle to replenish its fleet of 15 patrol cars as they wear out due to years of service and high mileage. Police emergency vehicles are typically "retired" when they reach seven years and/or approximately 100,000 miles.

Our new vehicle is

manufactured by the Ford Motor Company. The SUV is based on the Ford Explorer, but with several extra high-tech add-ons.

The new SUV's are fitted with heavy duty brakes, cooling, and electrical systems to cope with the rigors of police work. Also, the SUV's are very safe and have exceeded crash test expectations. The new SUV's have a high tech all wheel drive system that the old Crown Victoria did not have. This steering system is safer because the large car handles better while turning and displaces weight better. Most importantly, it can carry all of our accessories and safety gear needed while on patrol. The emergency lights are brighter and use modern

which makes them more visible during the daytime. Also, the siren has an added frequency that has deep bass sounds that is loud and safer as it can be heard by pedestrians that are wearing modern ear buds.

Several of our local neighboring allied agencies and the CHP have selected the Ford SUV police interceptor as the next generation police patrol vehicle.

Rey (Reynold) Ruppel was a major photographer of the Monterey Peninsula in the 1940s through the mid-1960s.

Born in 1914, Ruppel developed an early love of photography and travel. As soon as he finished high school, he began to photograph his adventures and travels during the Great Depression, hitchhiking, driving, and jumping trains from Coast to Coast. Ruppel arrived in Monterey in 1935 where, within three years, he was working with Monterey panoramic photographer A. C. Heidrick, and fulfilling his dream of studying with an innovative photographer. Ruppel's reputation as an accomplished photographer quickly grew as he documented our scenic land and seascapes, fishing industry, and celebrity and major events from Monterey to San Francisco. Besides Ruppel's photographic legacy, the collection features many

Heidrick original prints and negatives.

To process a photo collection of this magnitude requires an incalculable number of work hours. The project is well underway thanks to a team of highly skilled volunteers which includes Barbara Forbush, Joan Jeffers McCleary, and Chase Weaver. John Castagna is volunteering his time to scan the collection so that digital images will also be available. The Library is deeply grateful to our volunteers for undertaking this laborious project which will protect and make accessible this valuable local photographic collection and contribute immeasurably to the Library's vital role in preserving our community memory.

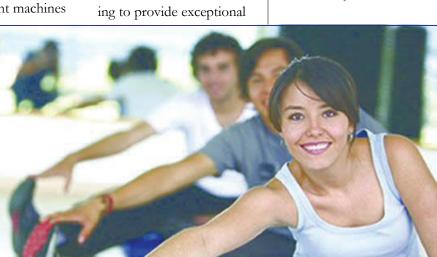

Our City has many unique features including the beautiful scenery, world-class parks and historic buildings that support the telling of Monterey's history. Another unique feature is the Neighborhood Improvement Program or NIP. Sixteen percent of the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) gets channeled into the NIP. The NIP is headed up by a team of dedicated neighborhood representatives who are all volunteers and serve on the NIP Committee. These Representatives meet regularly with their neighborhood associations in order to gage what matters most to their

neighborhoods. And if those needs include a capital improvement, then the Representative can voice that to the entire Committee. Capital improvements are basically any physical improvements that are not readily movable. Examples would be park equipment, buildings, road improvements, drainage improvements and improvements to buildings. Capital improvements do not include items such as books, vehicles or the cost to operate a program.

If you have something you feel needs to be addressed somewhere in our City - it does not have be in your neighborhood please find the submittal form at monterey.org/nip.

You need not be a property owner and you don't have to be a member of your neighborhood association in order to send in an idea. Your ideas will be routed to the appropriate Neighborhood Representative. Of course, your support and involvement in your neighborhood association helps in many ways.

The deadline for turning in a project nomination is February 14, 2014.

DOWNTOWN SPECIFIC PLAN ADOPTED!

Exciting things are happening in Downtown Monterey – watch for more to come! The City of Monterey adopted the Downtown Specific Plan in October 2013 wrapping up two-years of public outreach and planning efforts. The plan creates a clear, comprehensive vision on how to move forward with revitalization efforts. Projects

that were long-delayed are moving forward to implement this vision.

The first project that was designed in compliance with the new plan is a mixed use project at 459 Alvarado Street, the site destroyed by fire approximately seven years

ago. The project consists of two buildings. One building will front Alvarado Street and the second building will face Tyler Street. The Alvarado Street building is two stories and has an "old-time" Alvarado Street look.

The Tyler Street building is three-stories and has more modern lines. Parking will be sandwiched between the buildings and will not be visible from either Alvarado or Tyler Streets. Plans are available for review in the City Planning Office. The Planning Commission and Architec-

tural Review Committee will be reviewing these plans in early 2014 at public meetings.

The City is also considering applications for additional outdoor seating based on the Specific Plan vision. Outdoor seating applications have

been received for three existing businesses - Cibos, Crepes, Lallapalooza and two sites that are expected to have new uses – 426 Alvarado (Old Regency Theater) and 459 Alvarado (vacant/burned site).
