A Report from the City of Monterey to its Citizens and Friends

Residents encouraged to attend April 25 Study Session to learn more about the employee pension program



The City of Monterey has a defined pension benefit in the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS). This CalPERS system is underfunded. In January 2018, CalPERS reported that it had only 68 percent of funds to pay the estimated benefits. To adequately fund this benefit, the City's contribution to CalPERS is expected to rise substantially in the next few years. As a matter of fact, our contribution will almost double within the next 8 years.

In addition to the City's contribution towards CalPERS, all of our employees have been paying into the retirement system as well. Monterey's system stands out as our employees are contributing roughly one third (1/3) of the annual pension obligations.

A City Council study session is scheduled for Wednesday, April 25 at 4p.m. to inform the public and City Council about Monterey's unfunded liabilities in CalPERS. This study session will also serve as the kick-off meeting for a multi-phased approach by the City to develop measures for a Fiscal Health Response Plan.

We encourage all community members to attend. While no decisions can be made at a study session, it does provide an opportunity for ideas and discussion, and to learn the facts about this important topic that has potential long term impacts on city programs and services.

Monterey has a proud history of solvency, as well as being smart in budgeting and forecasting. We strive to be transparent and we want the community to be part of the decision-making.

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Measure P summer update By CAPITAL PROGRAMS COORDINATOR MEGAN BECKMAN

As we move into summer, residents can look forward to another round of Measure P project construction to improve Monterey streets, sidewalks and storm drains.

The sixth phase of street reconstruction and ADA ramp improvements will begin construction in Veteran's Memorial Park and the



Monterey Vista and Alta Mesa neighborhoods in mid May. In addition, approval of the construction contract for the sixth phase of street resurfacing will be brought to Council for approval in May.

This project includes approximately 750,000 square feet of slurry seal in Ryan Ranch and the Monterey Vista, Skyline Forest, Alta Mesa, Deer Flats, and Aguajito Oaks neighborhoods. The work indentified in these phases of construction has been planned to minimize impacts to residential neighborhoods while school is in session.

To date, the Measure P program has completed over 4.6 million square feet of pavement resurfacing and reconstruction, with street improvements completed in every neighborhood within the City of Monterey.


The Monterey Bay is unique and important in so many ways, and as such is designated by the state of California to be an Area of Special Biological Significance (ASBS).

There are 34 ASBS ocean areas monitored and maintained for water quality by the State Water Resources Control Board. ASBS cover much of the length of California's coastal waters. They support an unusual variety of aquatic life, and often host unique individual species. ASBS are basic building blocks for a sustainable, resilient coastal environment and economy. (Per the State Water Resources Control Board website.)

The City of Monterey and other local agencies play a major role in protecting Monterey Bay. Every resident and visitor can do the same.

Report Sanitary Sewage Spills and Illegal Dumping BY ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATIONS MANAGER TRICIA WOTAN

To report sanitary sewer spills and illegal dumping to the street, waterways, or the storm drain system, please call one of the following:

(831) 646-3921 (during business hours) (831) 646-3914 (during after hours) 9-1-1 (county-wide, anytime)

Dumping any pollutants or trash into the gutter, catch basin or the storm drain system is ILLEGAL. Please report sanitary sewer spills and any dumping to the City. Local ordinances limit storm water flows to clean rain water and non-polluted incidental flows like groundwater. Please do your part to protect local waterways!

Monterey Bay Community Power – "Flipping the switch" video

At the April 17, 2018 City Council meeting, Councilmembers directed the Planning

Commission to consider options for strengthening the City's wireless applications requirements. They also asked the Planning Commission to make a recommendation to the City Council that remains consistent with federal regulations. This direction was based on recent wireless permit applications submitted to the Planning Office last year.

ExteNet Systems did not submit an appeal of the March 15, 2018 Planning Commission decision by the deadline. The Planning Commission, at a special meeting, unanimously denied the small cell facility application. Just

a day prior to the meeting, ExteNet withdrew 12 of their 13 applications.

ExteNet submitted the applications to the City of Monterey Planning Office in June 2017 on behalf of the telecommunications company Verizon in order to install small cell facilities to improve cellular service coverage and data capacity in the Monte Vista neighborhood.

While ExteNet may resubmit new applications for the 12 applications that were withdrawn at a later date, or submit applications for new facilities at other locations, at this point they have not expressed to the City of Monterey their intent to do so. A request to reopen the application for the facility located adjacent to 277 Mar Vista Drive and 7 Cuesta Vista Drive within one year of the denial would be processed consistent with City Code section 38-166(B).

Bicycle safety

BY MONTEREY POLICE SERGEANT FRANK RUSSO Spring is upon us, and it's time to get out and enjoy our beautiful peninsula! An abundance of people will choose to enjoy the outdoors by riding their bicycles. Here are a few tips to make this recreational activity a safe and memorable experience for all!

But first, some hard facts. In 2016, National statistics show that 18,477 people were injured while riding a bicycle. 102 were killed; eight of them being children. Help reduce these numbers and keep your community safe by following or encouraging your loved ones to follow these simple tips:

- Wear an approved helmet and ride defensively.
- Obey ALL traffic laws, including stopping for traffic signals and stop signs.
- Ride with traffic on the right side of the roadway.
- Use bicycle lanes when available.

- Use caution when going by parked vehicles and driveways.
- Wear reflective gear and use front and rear lights when riding at night.

Because of their size, bicycles can be difficult to see, at night or during the day. So it is important that riders be predictable. Keep in mind that many riders are injured by car doors or when vehicles pull into or out of driveways. And remember, riders are subject to the same vehicle laws as motorists. So bike safe!


Upgraded video services on the Monterey Channel

Colton Hall Accessibility Upgrades

Accessibility improvements are underway to historic Colton Hall, where California's constitution was written and signed in 1849. Home to a museum upstairs and the Planning and Museums and Cultural Arts offices downstairs, the upgrades include reconstructing the back stairs and deck and adding a vertical stair lift to provide Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) access to the second floor, replacing the current two restrooms with one ADA compliant restroom that will accommodate a wheelchair, adding an access ramp in the rear courtyard, and configuring an adjacent ADA parking area.

"We wanted to make Colton Hall available to the whole community," said Acting Community Services Director Dennis Copeland. "Colton Hall is a historic treasure that should be shared with everyone who wants to visit."



Colton Hall Museum is open to the public every day from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., excluding Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day. Colton Hall will remain open from the front stairs, and there are no plans to change the open hours during construction. Groups who wish to visit

should call in advance (831-646-5640) to reserve a date and time. Both downstairs offices will be open regular hours. Expect some impacts to parking on King and Dutra streets (behind Colton Hall).

The total cost of upgrades is \$353,000, funded through a \$100,000 grant from



the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, a \$40,000 grant from the Community Foundation of Monterey County, and the balance from the City of Monterey's Neighborhood Improvement Program (NIP) and Capital Improvement Program (CIP).

Work is expected to be completed in July, 2018. Weekly construction updates, including unexpected impacts to access, will be posted at monterey.org/construction every Friday, or you can sign up to receive them by email at the same web address.



Great Pacific Race coming back this June

The Great Pacific Race organizers name it the World's ultimate endurance challenge. Ocean row boats of two and four people compete against each other in the first and only rowing race on the Pacific.

The next Great Pacific Race starts in June 2018 when teams from around the world will set out on a

2,400 mile journey across the world's largest ocean from Monterey, California to Honolulu, Hawaii.

This epic journey is expected to take between 30 and 80 days depending on the ability of the crew and the weather. Each boat carries no sails or engines and is only moved by the muscle of the crew pulling on the oars.

Featured Public Art -"The Grizzly Bears of Colton Hall" a sculpture by Kris Swanson The life-sized sculpture in front of Colton Hall pays tribute to the grizzly bear of California, and portrays the size and massiveness of this largest of all bears.

A formidable animal, the grizzly bear became the subject of legends. In the nineteenth century, they were hunted for their skin, meat and to protect the cattle herds. They were captured to provide animals for the violent spectacle of Bear and Bull fights. The grizzly bear was hunted to extinction in California by 1911.

A Bear Flag was used as the symbol for California as early as 1846, but 65

years passed before it was officially designated as the state emblem. Various bear images appeared on the flag until the design was standardized in 1953 modeled after an 1855 watercolor by Charles Nahl. This image was used as a model for the sculpture. A copy of the water color is in the City of Monterey collection and can be seen in Colton Hall Museum.

The Bear sculpture was created by Kris Swanson. Here's a video with more information about the Bear sculpture.
