

Report to City Manager
Monterey Police Department (MPD) Highlights
December 2017

NARRATIVE

- On December 17, 2017, the MPD received a call of an agitated family member in the 100 block of Surf Way, who was armed with a knife and a firearm. When officers arrived the subject shot at three Monterey Police Officers. The officers returned fire and the suspect was taken into custody. Thankfully, none of the officers were injured. The District Attorney has filed charges of attempted murder of the officers on the suspect.
- The MPD implemented a pharmaceutical drug take-back program, wherein the public may safely and anonymously dispose of unused/expired prescription or over-the-counter medications through the MPD. A press release was distributed and the information has been posted to the City's web site.
- The MPD collaborated with other city departments to create a homeless resource flyer that lists resources for homeless persons. The information is also available on the City's web site.
- The Monterey Police Officers Association (MPOA) received a donation from an anonymous donor. The monetary donation was used to buy Target and Safeway gift cards which officers are distributing to the needy in our community.
- Twenty Police Officers and two Community Services Officers attended the Mental Health First Aid course. The MPD will continue the training to meet the goals of the IACP "One-Mind Campaign" which is to have 100% of our officers trained in Mental Health First Aid. The Campaign seeks to ensure successful interactions between police officers and persons with mental illness through officer training and implementation of a model policy. The MPD continues to have 100% of active officers CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) trained.
- The Community Action Team (CAT) provided community outreach and education at the Alta Mesa area community meeting. The group discussed fraud, identity theft, and general security.
- CAT conducted a pre-planned, multi-agency extensive search of Laguna Grande Park. Officers searched a large amount of the park and marsh area, locating several abandoned camps and a large amount of property. This resulted in the Seaside Parks Department conducting a significant cleanup of Laguna Grande Park.
- Patrol received a tip of a wanted subject staying at a local hotel. CAT surveillance led to the arrest of three subjects for felony warrants and recovered narcotics.
- Monterey police officers coordinated a presentation, and a female officer shared her personal story, with the girls at the Monterey Pearl Status Club. The club supports girls making good choices as they become young women.
- The MPD School Resource Officer (SRO) was a guest speaker at a Walter Colton School forensic science class. He explained how fingerprinting works, gave a

demonstration, and brought materials so all the students could try lifting latent fingerprints.

- Officers working in the Tidelands areas made contact with several subjects. The contact resulted in locating a stolen handgun, a probation search by the Peninsula Regional Violence and Narcotics Team (PRVNT) in Seaside, and the recovery of a second stolen handgun.
- PRVNT arrested four subjects in connection with an attempted robbery/shooting in Sand City. The suspects fled the area after the shooting. PRVNT coordinated with and traveled to the Chula Vista Police Department and the Reno Police Department to make arrests, conduct interviews, and collect evidence.
- The MPD assisted the Greenfield and King City Police Departments with the formation of the Gang Suppression Unit Task Force. The unit will address the violent crime occurring in southern Monterey County as violent crimes in Greenfield and King City can impact the entire county.
- Monterey police officers responding to a burglary in progress at a local business secured a perimeter and located the suspect. The suspect was taken into custody without incident.
- The Investigations Division identified a burglary suspect using video footage obtained from a store that had been burglarized. The suspect was located, found in possession of stolen property and arrested.
- An MPD detective conducted an extensive investigation into three residential burglaries and determined all had the same housekeeper. He identified the suspect, executed a search warrant, recovered stolen property and obtained a confession.

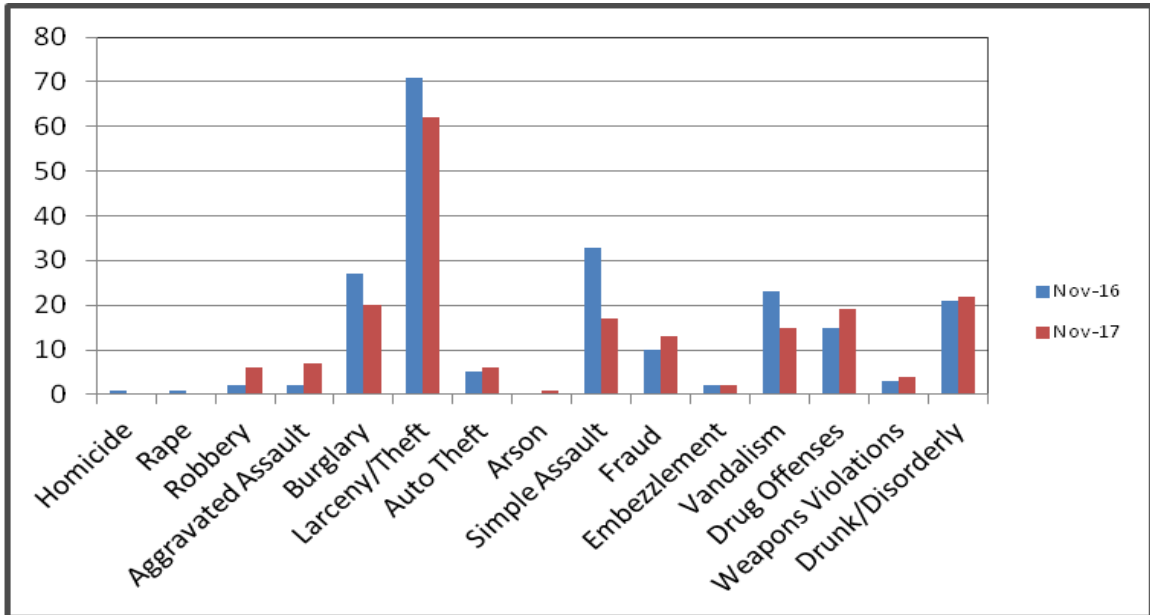


Table B – 2016 Monthly Average v. November 2017
