Narrative

Officer Involved Shooting

- On July 11, 2020, at approximately 11:01 p.m., Monterey Police Officers responded to a 911 call from a suicidal subject in the area of the Monterey Skate Park. The subject told the dispatcher he was armed with a firearm and wanted to hurt himself. As officers searched for the subject he made statements to the dispatcher that he was going to shoot the responding officers and hurt himself. At approximately 11:26 p.m., Officers located the subject in the cemetery armed with what appeared to be a pistol. A sergeant who was formerly assigned to the Crisis Negotiations Team of the Monterey Peninsula Regional Special Response Unit spoke to the subject on the phone in an effort to resolve the situation peacefully. After approximately 15 minutes, the subject, while holding the pistol in his hand, charged at two officers. A sergeant fired a less lethal projectile at the subject, striking him.

At approximately the same time, an officer fired one round from his patrol rifle. The rifle round did not strike the subject. The subject surrendered and was taken into custody. Officers later discovered the pistol the subject was holding was an airsoft BB gun made to look like a real Glock pistol. The subject was booked into the Monterey County Jail on charges of criminal threats, resisting arrest, and possession of a BB gun without the safety markings. The ongoing investigation into the officer involved shooting is being independently handled by the Monterey County District Attorney's Office. The investigation into the criminal charges against the subject was investigated by the Monterey Police Department. The Monterey Police Department's Internal Affairs Division is also monitoring the investigation and will conduct an internal review of the officer involved shooting.



Narrative

COVID-19

- The MPD continued to address issues surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The MPD continues to educate/enforce issues related to the State guidelines surrounding the increase or reduction in restrictions related to the pandemic.
 - When the State rolled back reopening, the CAT Team visited 28 salons to ensure they were in compliance and they did not discover any violations.
 - The CAT team investigated a complaint at a local Gym, the owner was educated regarding state guidelines and subsequent visits have not revealed violations.
 - The CAT team investigated a complaint at a Doctor's Office, no violations were observed and all of the employees and patients were in compliance.
- While City beaches were restricted from May 08, 2020 to June 6, 2020, the City closed all beaches for the July 4th weekend (07-03-20 to 07-05-20).
- Community Services Officers provided (30) hours of face covering education at Cannery Row and Wharf 1 and distributed (49) facemasks.
- The MPD has worked with Monterey City Code Compliance Officers, City Attorney's Office and District Attorney's Office to ensure businesses and individuals were complying with the State and County COVID-19 guidelines.
- Multiple hotels in Monterey have been housing COVID+ patients to shelter in place. Some of the hotels have been coordinated by Monterey County and others coordinated by the agricultural industry. MPD has responded to some of these hotels for various disturbances and other issues related to persons that have been placed at the hotels.





Narrative

Patrol

- MPD served a search warrant at a location regarding a subject who made death threats toward law enforcement and located a firearm, drugs and bomb-making materials.
- Patrol officers and the Community Action Team (CAT) responded to a strong-armed robbery. Officers searched for and located the suspect. Officers arrested the suspect and returned the property to the owner.
- Patrol officers and CAT responded to an armed robbery at a convenience store. The suspect attacked the clerk with a screwdriver while attempting to steal a case of beer. Officers located the suspect and took him into custody without incident.

Multi-Disciplinary Outreach Team (MDOT)

- MDOT facilitated housing for a homeless woman who was a victim of domestic violence.
- MDOT collaborated with the Veteran Resource Center to provide medical care and housing for a homeless person living on city property in the recently acquired location at the former Fort Ord.

- MDOT worked with the Veteran Resource Center to provide housing for a veteran living on the beach at Window on the Bay.
- MDOT collaborated with Gathering for Women to obtain a housing referral from the Central Coast Center for Independent Living (CCCIL), a 16-day hotel stay, and baby products for a young homeless mother and her two-week old child.

Investigations

- Detectives investigated a stalking and residential burglary case and obtained a felony arrest warrant with bail enhancement. The detectives located the suspect driving in Monterey and arrested him for the warrant and for resisting arrest.
- Detectives assisted with an officer involved shooting. Detectives obtained a Gun Violence Restraining Order against the suspect and worked through the night to coordinate evidence collection, which included photographs, videos, a collection of expended cartridges and a search of the suspect's vehicle.



Narrative

Community Action Team (CAT)

- In response to FY21 budget cuts and in an effort to reduce overtime, Officers assigned to the CAT Team have been covering patrol vacancies. MPD had a number of vacancies during July due to illness including COVID positive and vacation. CSOs have assisted by filling in as role players during FTO scenarios resulting in fewer Officers needed for training.
- In addition to reducing overtime, CAT Officers have been tasked with patrolling the newly acquired FORA property and the Old Capitol Site. Officers found homeless encampments and have been addressing specifically due to the fire danger in both of these areas. Officers have been utilizing ATVs to patrol these sites.
- As a result of CAT being utilized as described, regular patrols of the beach and parks was severely limited in July. This has resulted in an increase of encampments in both of these areas (and an increase in complaints). The Officers have addressed this by scheduling cleanups with parks and the contractors. These cleanups have taken anywhere between 6-8 hours.
- Abated (61) encampments. There were (28) at Del Monte Beach, (14) at Don Dahvee Park, (7) at Window on the Bay and (3) at El Estero Park. The remaining encampments were at various locations throughout the City. Officers provided flyers to homeless persons with information regarding services available to them.
- CAT Officers transported a homeless individual involved in a disturbance to a hotel provided by Gathering for Women and later delivered food to them.
- CAT Officers assisted four homeless persons complete and submit applications for housing.
- CAT Officers Assisted the Multi-Disciplinary Outreach Team (MDOT) with NARCAN distribution to local homeless persons suffering from opiate addiction.
- CAT Officers attended and participated in the following community meetings:
 - Chatswood Place in Skyline Forest
 - The North Fremont Business District.
- CHOMP notified CAT of a homeless subject that needed medical treatment for his infected feet. CAT officers located the homeless subject on the street and transported him to CHOMP to receive medical treatment.

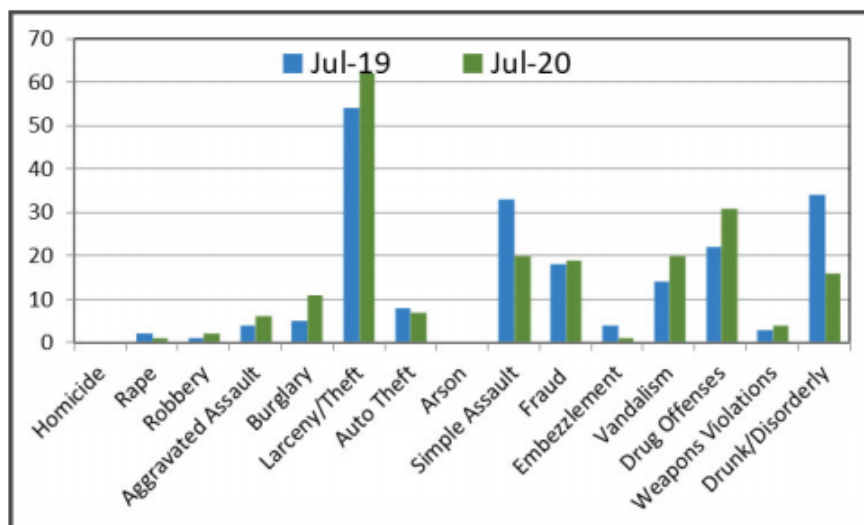


Table A- July 2019 v. July 2020

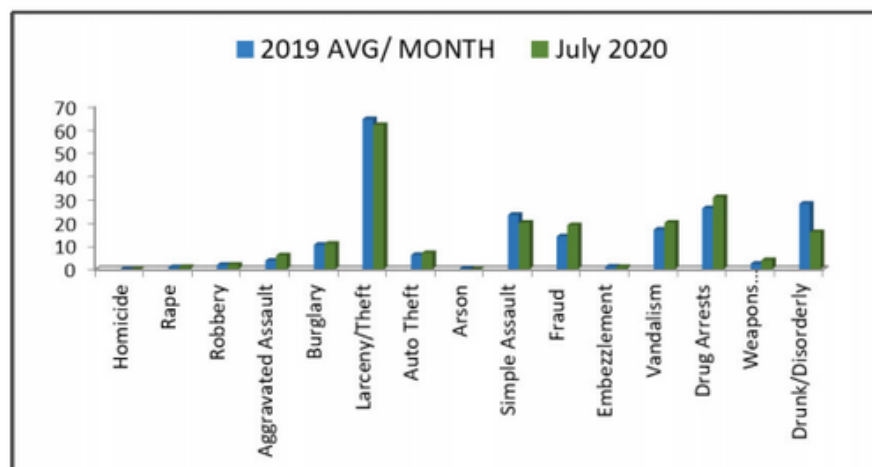


Table B- Monthly Average v. July 2020
