Patrol

- 09-11-2022- Officers responded to a report of an individual yelling at people and possibly brandishing a firearm. Officers located the suspect and determined the suspect was in possession of two NERF guns. The officers transported the subject for a psychiatric evaluation.
- 09-14-2022- MPD officers responded to a robbery report at a convenience store. The suspect entered the business, simulated a concealed handgun and demanded cash from the cashier. The cashier was in fear and gave the suspect cash and the suspect fled. Officers located and positively identified the suspect in Monterey. Officers arrested the suspect and transported her to Monterey County Jail.
- 09-15-2022 and 09-20-2022- The MPD responded to related reports of sexual batteries. On September 15, 2022, a woman was walking when a male rode up behind her on a bike and sexually battered her by grabbing her buttocks as he made an inappropriate comment and fled. The suspect was described as a white adult male with blue eyes, wearing a hooded sweatshirt and jeans, riding a black e-bike. On September 20, 2022, a woman was jogging when a male suspect rode past her, sexually battered her by slapping her buttocks as he rode by, fleeing north on the recreation trail. The suspect was described as wearing dark clothing riding a dark colored, possibly electric, bike. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-17-2022- MPD respond to a report of an off-leash dog being aggressive towards other dogs. The owner of the dog is an unhoused male, whom MPD officers have had previous encounters with. Officers requested the owner's identification to issue a citation for his dog being off leash, but the owner refused to provide identification and became argumentative. Officers arrested the subject and transported the dog to the city yard kennels.
- 09-17-2022- Officers responded to a solo vehicle collision. The driver was under the influence and hit the center median, then drove up onto a dirt area. The driver sustained minor injuries. The Northbound tunnel was closed for approximately one hour.



- 09-22-2022 – Officers located a subject who matched the description of a sexual battery suspect. The suspect fled from officers on an electric bike. The subject was able to get away from the officers.
- 09-22-2022- Officers responded to a report of a burglary and vehicle theft. Officers received the vehicle and suspect description and coordinated with surrounding law enforcement to locate the suspect. The Seaside Police Department located the suspect, positively identified him and arrested him. Officers determined the suspect was also an outstanding suspect from a car-jacking case in Seaside.
- 09-24-2022- MPD responded to a report of a subject threatening to stab a victim. Officers located the suspect and took him into custody.
- 09-24-2022- An MPD officer on patrol noticed a male and a female engaged in a verbal dispute. The officer attempted to contact them, and they fled in separate directions. The officer observed the female getting into a vehicle. When the officer tried to contact her, she drove away and into a parking structure, where she then climbed to the back seat of her vehicle and hid under blankets. Officers ultimately removed the female and arrested her for obstructing/delaying a peace officer, evading arrest, reckless driving, and a probation violation.





Investigations / Monterey Police Anti-Crime Team (IMPACT)

- 09-08-2022- A detective investigated a report of a male who exposed himself to two minors in a park. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-09-2022- A detective followed up on a report of a romance scam involving an elderly victim. The victim sent over \$25,000 to an unknown person. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-13-2022- Detectives investigated a report of an adult who made annoying sexual comments to a minor. Detectives identified the suspect and forwarded the case to the District Attorney's office.
- 09-13-2022- A detective followed up on a suspect arrested for possession of drugs possession of mail and financial documents that did not belong to him. The documents were taken for over fifty people across Monterey County. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-13-2022- Detectives investigated a fraud case in which a suspect fraudulently represented themselves as a utility company employee and tricked a victim into sending them over \$1,000. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-13-2022- Detectives investigated a credit card case. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-14-22- Detectives investigated a report of electronics stolen from a vehicle. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-14-2022- Detectives investigated an organized retail theft of over \$40,000 in merchandise from a business. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-23-2022- A detective contacted a subject and arrested him for possession of drug paraphernalia.
- 09-29-2022- Detectives followed up on an organized retail crime after a \$5,500 theft from a retail store. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-29-2022- Detectives investigated a report of \$16,000 in fraudulent charges at a business. The investigation is ongoing.
- 09-29-2022- Detectives investigated a domestic violence incident where the suspect fled. The suspect later surrendered themselves at the Monterey Police Department.
- 09-29-2022- Detectives followed up on a report of a parent who choked their child at the Monterey County Fair and arrested the suspect.

Narcan Administered Lifesaving

- Two MPD officers administered Narcan to a male who overdosed in an encampment. AMR transported him to CHOMP for further evaluation and treatment. Officers notified SURT.
- A male overdosed on opioids in Monterey. The victim's friend administered three doses of Narcan before the arrival of police and paramedics. AMR transported the subject to CHOMP for further treatment and evaluation. Officers notified the Substance Use Response Team (SURT).
- A male overdosed on opioids in Monterey. The victim's friend administered Narcan before police, paramedics, and fire arrived. The victim declined transportation to CHOMP. Officers notified SURT which responded to the scene to provide the victim and friend with resources.
- Officers responded to a report of a female who overdosed on opioids. Her boyfriend administered Narcan to her. She refused transportation to CHOMP.



Community Action Team (CAT)

- CAT participated in weekly meetings regarding the Substance Abuse Response Team (SURT).
- CAT participated in International Park(ing) Day
- CAT attended a North Fremont Business District meeting.
- CAT provided a station tour to a group of young adults from Independent Living.

Multidisciplinary Outreach Team (MDOT)

- CAT attended an outreach coordination meeting with the Coalition of Homeless Service Providers.
- CAT and MDOT social workers worked together to conduct several assessments for unhoused persons seeking services.
- CAT teamed with members of the Coalition of Homeless Service Providers to conduct outreach.
- CAT transported an unsheltered woman with a chronic alcohol addiction to the Gathering for Women. CAT helped her enroll in the I-Help for Women program.
- CAT assisted an unsheltered male with round-trip bus fare to court. The subject is also working with Interim.
- CAT referred a Domestic Violence advocate to an unsheltered woman who is a victim of domestic violence.
- CAT assisted an unsheltered woman living in her vehicle with an interview with the One Starfish Safe Parking organization.



Case Study - John Doe 0922 (September 2022)

In an effort to explain some of the challenges faced by the MPD in trying to problem solve through a variety of ways, these case studies highlight aspects that the MPD and partners in MDOT face while attempting to resolve issues. This month’s case study provides another challenging example.

DOE 0922 is a 30-years old unhoused individual. DOE 0922 has had (65) police contacts since 2015. DOE suffers from diagnosed mental health issues. DOE 0922 refuses to take his prescription medication on a regular basis. He self-medicates with illicit drugs and alcohol. When not utilizing his prescription medication, Doe 0922 becomes very aggressive toward the community and law enforcement in Monterey.

DOE 0922 has been placed on multiple psychiatric evaluations since 2016. Some of DOE’S behaviors include business and peace disturbances, public altercations to include battery, and vandalism to property. In several psychiatric evaluations Doe 0922 was released from the hospital within hours of being taken there.

Some of Doe 0922’s arrest history since 2016 includes:

- Arrested for causing a peace disturbance and possession of methamphetamine pipes.
- Arrested for felony vandalism of public utilities property and public intoxication.
- Arrested for Arson and possession of drug paraphernalia. Convicted for Arson, drug paraphernalia charge was dismissed.
- Served over six months in county jail for Arson, out of custody on probation for two years.
- Arrested for trespassing. Case dismissed in the furtherance of justice.
- Arrested for Prowling. Case dismissed in the furtherance of justice.

The MDOT team interacts with DOE 0922 on a constant and consistent basis. DOE 0922 has denied services and refuses assistance. As this case study shows, the criminal justice system is lacking, the mental health system is lacking and while Doe 0922 is resistant to assistance there is an obvious disconnect with DOE 0922’s diagnosis and some type of government assistance.



National Incident Based Reporting System

The Monterey Police Department (MPD) transitioned to the California and National Incident-Based Reporting Systems (CIBRS and NIBRS) on March 1, 2022 and has completed the required three (3) month validation period. CIBRS and NIBRS reporting meets state and federal data standards and supports the national transition to NIBRS. As the new data collection standard, NIBRS captures all offenses within an incident – up to ten crime occurrences, representing a substantial shift in crime reporting. The additional detailed crime incident data provides greater analytic capability and makes NIBRS a superior crime-reporting method when compared to the previously utilized Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) standard. MPD has fully transitioned to NIBRS reporting and discontinued UCR reporting.

This new reporting yields a different format for data collection and is divided into Group A and Group B offenses. Group A offenses are the more serious crimes such as Murder, Rape, Robbery, etc. Group B offenses tend to be minor offenses, such as Curfew, Loitering and Vagrancy Violations, Disorderly Conduct, and Driving Under the Influence.

The data is grouped into three (3) crime categories of Crimes Against Persons (counted per victim), Crimes Against Property (counted per incident), and Crimes Against Society (counted per crime against society). Crimes against persons include assault, homicide, human trafficking, kidnapping and sex offenses. Crimes against property include robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. Crimes against society include drug/narcotic offenses, gambling, pornography, prostitution, liquor law violations, disorderly conduct, peeping tom, curfew/vagrancy violations, trespassing, driving under the influence, and weapon law violations.

Law enforcement agencies report data from each offense and arrest for Group A offenses, but report only arrest data for Group B offenses. There are more offenses reported in NIBRS, more details per incident, and arrests and offenses linked in NIBRS.
